

Diocesan Office Administrator Announced



The Episcopal Diocese of North Dakota is pleased to announce the appointment of Kelly Noack as our new Office Administrator. Along with Bishop Ely and others she will be a part of the circle of leadership envisioned in the New Season of Ministry report adopted at the 2020 Diocesan Convention last fall. The hiring of Kelly is the result of a multi-month

discernment process that included an interview team of six people who are especially familiar with the administrative needs of the diocese. With this call, the diocesan Ministry Support Team is now complete.

For the last five years, Kelly has served as a finance specialist and administrative assistant at Concordia College in Moorhead. She has prior experience as a project coordinator for the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program in Billings, Montana, and for the North Dakota Public Employees Association, and as religious education coordinator for the Unitarian Universalist Church in Fargo. These positions along with retail work have instilled in her a particular appreciation for providing great customer service through careful listening and problem-solving. She is excited to share this value, her considerable administrative experience, and her ability to figure out new challenges. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Communications from Minnesota State University in Moorhead.

### From Our Bishop

Dear people of the Episcopal Diocese of North Dakota.

Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus, who is the Way of Love.

We are now in our eighth month together, since you welcomed me into this New Season of Ministry in the Diocese of North Dakota as your Bishop Provisional. It has been a rich and rewarding time for me as I have come to know so many of you and have had the joy of visiting most of the congregations of our diocese, either in person or virtually. The idea of a New Season of Ministry does not negate or ignore the heritage of our ancestors who established our diocesan life and championed the Way of Love for generations. What it does signal is a new chapter in our common life, a season of discernment and ministry in which we are journeying together to a future, as yet unknown, but nonetheless filled with the promise of God's abiding love and presence.

Our Diocesan Convention this year will celebrate our journey under the theme of "Dancing Into a New Season of Ministry: Growing Community to Seed God's Mission." We are still planning an in-person Convention at the Radisson Hotel in Bismarck, October 8-9, 2021. The plan is to offer various workshops and trainings on Friday afternoon, enjoy a meal together Friday evening during which I will offer some reflections on this New Season of Ministry and our common life. Saturday will feature a morning Eucharist with the theme of Reconciliation and Renewal, followed by presentations and discussion in table groups around the 2022 Diocesan Budget, the Mutual Ministry Review Matrix developed by Diocesan Council and other matters related to our common life. During lunch on Saturday, clergy and lay delegates will meet by region (East and West) for election of Diocesan Council representatives and other discussion. After lunch, the Convention will take up various matters of business, including resolutions and elections. The hope of the Planning Team is that this Convention will be a celebration of our mission and ministry along with an opportunity to build and (continued on page 4)



# The Work of Reconciliation in the Diocese

The reconciliation committee is meeting regularly with the aid of The Rev. Sheneequah Broken Leg, our reconciliation consultant. We are engaging in work that shows us where we are, where we want to go, and what obstacles are in our way, in order to develop a plan for the future of reconciliation in the Diocese of North Dakota. It is a very exciting and productive time for us as we do this work and hope to be able to share it with everyone in the near future.

#### From Our Diocesan Minister

As I complete my first month in North Dakota, I can confidently say that I am loving my job, falling in love with the people and places, and so grateful for the invitation to join this diocesan community in embracing the challenges and opportunities before us!

Our Diocesan Council has created an ambitious and inspiring New Season of Ministry Mutual Ministry Review Matrix, which I am using as the guiding document for my to-do list. The Matrix Goals are printed elsewhere in this issue of *The Sheaf* and fully available on the diocesan web site. The Council is inviting the full Convention to affirm it.

I am very happy to embody the completion of the first goal in the Matrix, filling the position of Diocesan Minister, and I look forward to working with our new Office Administrator, Kelly Noack, beginning Sept. 7, and with Bishop Tom, our newly hired Northwest Ministry coordinator Kim Becker, and our canon missioner Hal Weidman, as we form the diocesan Ministry Support Team (dMST) circle of leadership. We have begun meeting biweekly via Zoom, along with Finance Committee members Charlotte Peterson and Bart Davis, and the dMST is also planning periodic in-person team retreats, beginning September 10.

While I have begun to get up to speed on maintaining our venerable web site and email system, and Charlotte has been leading us in implementing Realm for connecting our leadership, Kelly's arrival will allow us to really address various ways of communicating across the diocese, using up to date technology and a diversity of media for reaching everyone. We hope to engage consultants to conduct a full communications audit to support this work. Kelly will also help us to be faithful to our canonical and administrative commitments, and to promote more financial transparency, in partnership with our Finance Committee. I am very grateful for John Floberg and his offer to edit this edition of *The Sheaf* while we get our communications efforts going.

My initial priority has been to meet clergy and lay leaders around the diocese and, while I have already met individually or in small groups with about 40 people from at least 14 of our congregations, as well as attending many meetings with many others, I have a long way to go! Please let me know if you would like to schedule a meeting. It has been a joy to hear stories of ministry and life in this diocese and to begin to explore hopes and dreams. I have also

enjoyed celebrating Eucharist with some of our smaller churches and begun to consider how best to support sacramental ministry in congregations without regular access to a priest, including the diverse community that is St. John's in Moorhead. It has also been fun to get to know Kim Becker and some of the leaders in the congregations in the Northwest. I look forward to supporting her work and the development of the teams in these communities.

Just recently I have met with Donna Pettit and begun to talk about convening the new Congregational Development Committee. We are working on finding a time to meet soon to share hopes and strategize. I have also met with Harvey Henderson of the Commission on Ministry, especially about reviving the School for Ministry. We are envisioning an event later in the fall as we begin to develop a cohesive longterm plan. Both groups hope to offer workshops at Convention. Watch the Convention web page for details! Council has just decided to share the \$40,000 in pandemic relief from Executive Council with each of our 20 congregations -\$2,000 each – to address local needs. I see this as an excellent opportunity for all of our congregations to exercise the congregational development muscles of seeking to understand and respond to the passions and concerns in our neighborhoods – what God is up to in the world.

Two areas of concern I have been hearing a lot in my conversations are around engaging youth and addressing the need for reconciliation among Native American and non-Native communities, East and West, large and small, inclusivity of LGBT people, etc. Stories of atrocious treatment of Native American children in the past, the church's role, and people's anger, have especially challenged me to

strengthen community across the diocese, especially since it has been two years since Convention has met in person.

Mindful of the realities of the ongoing Covid-19 health crisis, Diocesan Council has approved the recommendations from our Covid Protocol Team, chaired by Dr. John Baird. You can find those on the diocesan website. In the spirit of our call to love God and one another, we ask each congregation and member of the clergy to covenant with each other to:

- a. Send only delegates, clergy, and guests who are vaccinated
- b. Discuss issues in advance among members so delegates can represent all
- c. Wear masks when in groups indoors
- d. Maintain a proper distance (3 to 6 feet) when unmasked, such as for meals
- e. Maintain safe distancing and masking for any children who are not yet vaccinated

We will livestream the bishop's remarks on Friday night, the Saturday morning Eucharist, and the Convention plenary sessions. There will not be a provision for voting online.

It is my hope that all canonically resident clergy will attend, as they are able, and that each congregation will send a full contingent of lay delegates. Registration information is on the diocesan website. I also want to encourage any guests who might want to join us for all, or part, of the Convention to register. We are offering a special Friday only registration for guests.



The Episcopal Diocese of North Dakota is pleased to announce the appointment of the Reverend Kim Becker as Regional Coordinator for Episcopal Ministry in Northwestern North Dakota, effective August 1, 2021. This new position is partially funded through a grant from the Roanridge Foundation and includes ministry among five Episcopal Congregations in the Northwest quadrant of North Dakota: All Saints, Minot; Saint Sylvan's, Dunseith; Saint Paul's, White Shield; Saint Peter's, Williston; and Saint Michael & All Angels, Cartwright. The grant envisions enabling these congregations to join together for friendship and support, to learn from one another, to hear and respond to God's call to for faithful living in five very diverse places. Kim will serve as a resource person for all five congregations, from her home office in Minot.

Of mixed descent, including Cherokee, Kim brings 20 years of ordained ministry experience, most recently in the Diocese of Kentucky, where she was a hospital ICU chaplain and where she also trained with Dr. Catherine Meeks as a racial healing leader. In addition, she has served as rector, supply priest, hospice chaplain, and licensed wellness coach. Kim's ministry is driven by her fascination with people's stories and her pastoral gift for meeting people where they are—assisting in meaning-making during hard times and celebration during times of joy. Originally from North Carolina, Kim has also

served in the dioceses of Washington and Western North Carolina. Her dad was a priest, canon pastor, and Air Force chaplain. Her mother is an EFM graduate and Daughters Of the King member.

Kim is mom to one grown son, Alex, an artist in Baltimore. She is also a poet whose imagination is already captivated by the wide skies and open plains of North Dakota. She looks forward to serving as a resource for the Northwest region of the

Diocese and is eager to get to know the people in this part of God's creation. In her role as Northwest Regional Ministry Coordinator, Kim will, with the help of our Bishop Provisional, Diocesan Minister, and the diocesan North Dakota School for Ministry (NDSM), help these congregations identify, raise up, and train leaders with gifts and skills appropriate to their diverse settings. She will also provide an additional sacramental and pastoral presence at worship and coordinate the clergy resources presently available in the region.

#### Resolution For Convention

Acceptance of the New Season of Ministry Mutual Ministry Review Matrix and Creation of a New Season of Ministry Task Force - Proposed by the Diocesan Council August 14, 2021

Whereas the Diocesan Council and Bishop's Transition Committee developed a Mutual Ministry Review Matrix to evaluate progress on the New Season of Ministry activities (based largely on the Diocesan Discernment Task Force Report found at this link: <a href="https://ndepiscopal.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/09/A-DDTF-Final-Report-to-Convention-1.pdf">https://ndepiscopal.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/09/A-DDTF-Final-Report-to-Convention-1.pdf</a>); and,

Whereas the Diocesan Council gave final approval to the Mutual Ministry Review Matrix on August 14, 2021 (see Revised Matrix on the Convention Page of the Web Site: <a href="https://ndepiscopal.org/2021-diocesan-convention/">https://ndepiscopal.org/2021-diocesan-convention/</a>); and,

Whereas one of the goals in the Mutual Ministry Review Matrix is to establish a Diocesan *Way of Love Mission Focus* based on the Episcopal Church's *Living the Way of Love* practices that help provide guidance on meeting the spiritual and material needs of our parishes, communities, and the world (see <a href="https://www.episcopalchurch.org/way-of-love/">https://www.episcopalchurch.org/way-of-love/</a>); and,

Whereas a New Season of Ministry Task Force is proposed to begin work in January 2022 to assist the Diocese and parishes with identifying specific activities and a timetable for carrying out the Diocesan *Way of Love Mission Focus*; now therefore be it

### Recommendations of COVID-19 Task Force for Diocesan Convention

Approved by Diocesan Council for diocesan-wide distribution – August 14, 2021

COVID-19 has been with us for some time. It appeared infections were decreasing and that we could totally back off, but now we face a resurgence of infections from the delta variant. On August 2 we recommended that each congregation decide their policy since they know their own situation. Vaccinations were strongly encouraged as the best way to prevent further spread of COVID, and masks should be worn at indoor services if community transmission is substantial or high.

In the meantime, more of our state has increased the risk of transmission to substantial or high. We are called to love God and love our neighbor including the weak and vulnerable. Our task force offers its recommendations concerning gathering for Diocesan Convention.

- 1) Meet in person. It is important for us to meet in person. We missed this opportunity last year and much is gained being together in convention.
- 2) Covenant together. We ask each congregation and member of the clergy to covenant with each other to:
  - a. Send only delegates, clergy, and guests who are vaccinated, b. Discuss issues in advance among members so delegates can represent all, c. Everyone wears masks when in groups indoors, d. Maintain a proper distance (3 to 6 feet) when unmasked, such as for meals, e. Maintain safe distancing and masking for any children who are not yet vaccinated
- 3) Limit exposure during meals. We will have a plated dinner, buffet breakfast, and a Saturday box lunch. Try to keep a distance when eating and be unmasked for the short time needed to eat.
- 4) Holy Communion to be distributed in one form. Distribute only bread for communion of those at the worship service
- 5) Live stream highlights. Use livestreaming for the bishop's address Friday night, the Holy Eucharist, Saturday morning and to share the larger plenary gatherings of Diocesan Convention on Saturday. It is too cumbersome to have a 2-way discussion or voting via live stream. Delegates should be prepared to discuss issues their congregation may want brought up.
- 6) Check with the Radisson. See if they have mask signage and if they have any requirements for groups.

Thanks to the generosity of the people of the Episcopal Diocese of North Dakota, children treated at the Brace Shop associated with St. Vincent's Center for Children with Disabilities, in Port au Prince, Haiti, will continue to receive life-changing orthopedic treatment, through a gift for brace shop supplies. Some children will indeed be able to take up their mats and walk!

Because the political and security situation in Haiti is so difficult, it was determined to take funds budgeted for Haiti outreach in the Diocesan budget and direct them to this mission and put further activities on hold until the situation stabilizes. While this is discouraging, it enabled us to send funds that will provide brace shop materials for a full year. The Brace Shop employs deaf St. Vincent's Center students or graduates. Please take a minute to read the latest N'Ap Kanpe Ansanm (We Stand Together), the newsletter from St. Vincent's (<a href="www.stvincentshaiti.org">www.stvincentshaiti.org</a>) that highlights not only two of these students but acknowledges this important gift.

It is gratifying to me to ponder how far reaching and consequential gifts from this Diocese can be. With this gift, along with the funding of a medical laboratory at the main clinic at St. Vincent's through a grant from the North Dakota Episcopal Foundation, we have shared our blessings with God's people in Haiti and helped make their difficult lives a bit less so.

#### Reflections on Council

By: Leo Wilking, Diocesan Chancellor The Diocesan Council met at Grace Church in Jamestown on May 22, 2021. The Rev. Robert Hoekstra was a gracious host and prepared his specialty – home-made pizza – for those who attended in person (others appeared via Zoom).

The Finance Committee presented four important resolutions for consideration by the Council and all were approved by unanimous vote:

- 1. The Diocesan Council will establish a Task Force, which is to include a member of the Finance Committee, to evaluate and review the Our Fair Share formula, listen to congregations, and develop a new Our Fair Share policy to be presented at the Diocesan Convention.
- 2. The Diocese will send, in addition to the four regular Clergy delegates and four regular Lay delegates, a First Alternate Clergy delegate and a First Alternate Lay delegate to the 80th General Convention scheduled for July 2022 in Baltimore, Maryland. This will allow better coverage of the multitude of meetings, presentations and reports which occur at General Convention.
- 3. A revised Policy for Financial Management as distributed to the Council.
- 4. A timeline for the 2022 budget process recommended by the Committee, which indicated the 2022 budget would be approved by Council at its meeting on August 14 and distributed to Convention delegates in early September.

Reports were received from numerous committees. The Congregational Development Committee presented a two-part request which was approved without objection:

- 1. Change the name of the New Church Plantings Fund to the "Congregational Revitalization and Renewal Fund" and broaden the use of the fund.
- 2. Designate up to \$50,000 from this fund for the Northwest Ministry Initiative.

By: Amy Phillips, Standing Committee Member In its meeting on Saturday August 14, the Diocesan Council dealt with several financial matters. The Council approved the 2021 Year-to-Date Financial Report and voted to recommend the 2022 Diocesan Budget to Convention. The Council also voted to disperse \$40,000 to Diocesan parishes for Covid relief. The funds were given to the Diocese by The Episcopal Church for this purpose, and each parish will receive \$2,000.

In other actions, the Council approved the Mutual Ministry Review Matrix (a list of goals and actions developed by Bishop Ely and the Transition Committee) and approved a Resolution for Convention establishing a "New Season of Ministry Task Force" which will help the Diocese formulate a vision for its future.

The Council adopted a Covid Protocol for Convention, developed by Dr. John Baird and the other members of the Diocesan Covid-19 Task Force. The full Protocol will be distributed to congregations before the Convention. The Task Force decided that it was important to hold the Convention in person but asks that each congregation covenant to:

- "a) send only delegates who are vaccinated,
- b) discuss issues in advance among members,
- c) ensure that everyone wears masks when in groups indoors,
- d) maintain a proper distance (3 to 6 feet) when unmasked, such as for meals."

It is the hope and expectation of the Diocesan Council that this year's Convention will be a productive and joyous event, helping to inaugurate a Diocesan New Season of Ministry.

The Executive Council of The Episcopal Church has made available \$40,000 to each diocese for pandemic relief. ### St. Gabriel's Camp

Implementing Covid-19 Protocols that relied on every person being tested and found negative upon arrival at camp, three sessions were able to be held during the months of June, July and August. In all 55 teens were registered to attend camp - which is lower than the typical 90+ teens that normally populate the four day long camp.

Among those giving talks at the camp this year were Bobbie Grey Eagle, Chaska Moore, Isaiah Floberg and Fr. John Floberg. The topics ranged from recovering from the Pandemic to growing a personal faith in Jesus.

Among the support and leadership staff of the camp were Dn. Sloane Floberg (often time finding her in the camp's kitchen), several recent high school graduates and a few college-aged young adults.

This was the Camp's 25<sup>th</sup> Season of operation and the first full season using the newly constructed Star Lodge and a fully remodeled bathhouse (thanks to a grant from NDEF). A replacement speedboat specially equipped to pull a three-person tube was added to the mix this year, and the decade old pool was replaced with a salt water pool as well.

Of special note is that with the Solar Panels fully connected the electric bill for June and July totaled \$2.00 - a savings of \$200.00 for the same period in other years.
